

Bill Ryan's clearance skyrockets

SOUTHPORT'S hopes for the 1975 Aussie Rules premiership were boosted during the week when former VFL star, Bill Ryan, was cleared by Cooparaport. The clearance has been a controversial issue for several weeks and it was felt the burly ruckman would fail to gain the nod following talks in Brisbane a week ago.

Ryan, 31, joined Cooparaport two seasons ago from VFL club, Cootong, and was responsible for that club's rise in the Brisbane competition as well as the improved showing by the State side in inter-State matches.

Ryan told the Bulletin yesterday he was delighted that Cooparaport had granted the clearance and was looking forward to playing on the Gold Coast.

State side

He trained with the State side in Brisbane on Wednesday and said he

was available to play for Queensland in the game against Tasmania in Brisbane on May 18.

Southport president, Dr Alan McKenzie, said the news of Ryan's clear knee was like a breath of fresh air and had lifted club morale 100 per cent.

He added that the ruckman's vast experience would have a big bearing on the many young players within the Southport club.

Dr McKenzie said the club had also applied for two other players from Cooparaport — Steve

Hunter, a utility player from Geelong Reserves, and Mike Mansfield, from Mt Gambier.

He said there was hope for a clearance for Hunter, but a late report is that Mansfield has returned to South Australia.

Maggie coach, Bob Webb, in another who is pleased that the Ryan clearance is finally resolved.

Strong group

He said there was a strong group now in training at Owen Park and Ryan's ability was sure to enhance the club's prospects for the 1975 premiership.

Webb said the Magpies had secured several outstanding recruits for the coming season.

He said two of these, Steve Merritt and former Footscray player, Zane Taylor, had shown terrific form so early in the season.

In training

Webb added that most of last year's team were new in training and if there were going to be any shortage it would be in the rucking division.

The Magpies experienced similar problems last year.

Players are required for the club's Under 19 team and those interested can attend training each Tuesday or Thursday afternoon at Owen Park.
